



OFFICIAL PLAN UPDATE

What is an Official Plan?

An Official Plan is the primary land use planning document of the Town that contains vision, goals, objectives and policies established primarily to manage and direct land use and its effects on the social, economic and/or natural environment of the Town.

Official plans may also contain a description of the measures and procedures proposed to attain the objectives of the plan. Official Plans are designed to manage land use on the basis of a 20 year time horizon.

Why update the Official Plan?

- The Ontario Planning Act requires that all municipal Official Plans be reviewed and updated every five years.
- The Official Plan must be brought into conformity with recent changes to Provincial Plans including the Provincial Policy Statement, the Greenbelt Plan and the Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe.
- The timing is right to listen to citizens and stakeholders and chart a path for the Town that recognizes and responds to an evolving global economy.

Town of Lincoln Official Plan

- The current Official Plan was approved on December 18, 1992 and updated in 2005.
- During this period, the Town grew by approximately 5,485 people.
- To date, there have been about 47 Official Plan Amendments to the Town of Lincoln Official Plan.

Provincial Policy Statement 2005

The Provincial Policy Statement (PPS) contains overall policy direction on matters of Provincial interest related to land use planning and development. Matters of Provincial interest identified in the PPS include:

- Protection of natural resources;
- Public health and safety; and,
- Quality of the natural environment.

The Greenbelt Plan

The Provincial Greenbelt Plan provides clarity and certainty about urban structure, where and how future growth should be accommodated, and types of land and features that should be protected for current and future generations.

The Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe

The Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe is a 25-year plan that aims to maximize the benefits of growth within existing urban areas. This Plan sets clear Provincial standards for growth and development, yet provides some limited flexibility to address local circumstances.

Public Consultation

Public Consultation is an important aspect of an Official Plan Update. It is necessary to allow planners to better understand the values and planning issues within the community.
